## Why your contribution

to the Bishop Charles Wesley Jordan scholarship matters:

Based on the tuition rate for the 2016-17 academic year, the tuition cost alone for a Master of Divinity Degree will be **\$63,360** (based on 72 credit hours.)

There is a great need to provide scholarships to offset this tremendous burden for future generations of church pastors. Providing scholarship money is a gift to all who will seek a spiritual home in which to grow, learn, and love in the example of Jesus.

Student enrollment has increased over the last 3 years, including:



- The number of students preparing for pastoral ministry by pursuing a Master of Divinity
- The number of African American students pursuing a theological education at CST

Claremont School of Theology has also made theological education more accessible through our Hybrid/Online Master of Divinity degree. Students in this program can complete their Master of Divinity degree through a combination of online classes, intensive short-term courses on campus, and classes that combine intensive classroom sessions with online work.
