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The Significance of Lent

n our Christian tradition, the season of Lent serves as a period of reflection, repentance, and spiritual growth, mirroring the 40 days Jesus spent fasting in the desert, facing temptations from the devil. These temptations act as powerful reminders of the struggles between the desires of the flesh and the call of the spirit that we encounter in our own lives.

During the civil rights movement, African Americans faced temptations akin to those experienced by Jesus in the desert. The first temptation, to turn stones into bread, symbolized the desire for immediate relief from centuries of injustice and hardship. Like Jesus, who resisted by affirming the importance of spiritual sustenance, African Americans found strength and resilience in faith, community, and determination to seek justice and equality.

The second temptation, offering all the kingdoms of the world in exchange for worship, mirrored the allure of societal acceptance and conformity at the cost of one's identity and values. Systematic discrimination and oppression can tempt us compromise principles for the promise of fleeting privileges. The God-given desire for connection and acceptance might be distorted into an appetite for power, fame and possessions. Yet, like Jesus, who stood firm in worshiping God alone (Matthew 4:10), and as our ancestors who remained steadfast in their commitment to justice, dignity, and freedom for all, so may we overcome by nourishing our souls with the word of God and a firm commitment to principle.

The third temptation, to throw oneself down from the pinnacle of the temple and call on angels to save, represented the temptation to rely on external saviors or miraculous interventions rather than taking action and responsibility for change. Jesus countered this temptation by declaring, "Do not put God to the test" (Matthew 4:7), emphasizing the importance of humility and absolute trust in God. In the struggle for civil rights, African Americans were urged to trust in their own agency, resilience, and perseverance, relying on God rather than passively waiting for others to rescue them.

As we reflect on the temptations faced by Jesus in the desert and draw parallels to the challenges encountered by African Americans during the civil rights movement, we are reminded of the enduring power of faith, courage, and resistance in the face of adversity. Just as Jesus overcame the temptations by relying on God's word, African Americans triumphed over injustice through their unwavering belief in justice, equality, and the inherent dignity of every individual.

Let us use this season of Lent to honor the legacy of those who fought for civil rights, to recommit ourselves to the pursuit of justice and equality for all, and to draw inspiration from their example of faith, resilience, and unwavering dedication to a better world. May we be guided by their courage and determination as we confront the temptations of our time and strive to create a more just, compassionate, and inclusive society for future generations.



worked at a LAUSD Elementary School for 28 years. It was around the spring of 2006 when the school I worked at had a minimum day schedule for a eek. All the children got out of school at 12:00 pm.

I had been driving to work and back home. Well, I decided I would start walking to work since it wasn't that far. I felt I could get plenty of exercise by walking. The next morning, I walked to work.

I had a very good day with the children and my co-workers, I started walking home on a residential street, carrying my coat and purse. By the time I got about three blocks from the school, I had an eerie feeling.

I turned around and looked behind me, and there was someone ducking behind the bushes. I thought it was a child playing, so I continued to walk. I turned and looked again. A young man was stalking me. I began to walk faster and faster. Soon I made a right turn. I ran all the way to the end of the block and turned to see if he was going to show up on the other end from where I ran, and he did. He came out of a crouching position and stood straight up, seeming to wonder how I got way on the other end of the block so fast. He was discouraged and walked back to where he came from.

I went home angry because of that young guy. The next morning, I was getting ready to drive to work. I stopped and was thinking, I want to walk and get my exercise. So I said to myself and to the Lord, "I'm not going to let that stop me from getting my exercise. This is something I want to do." This time I walked the boulevard to work that morning. Once again, I had a great day, and instead of going down the residential street, I went back the way I came on the main street.

As I was crossing the street on my way home, a German Shepherd dog walked up next to me. It made me jump because no one was with the dog, and I didn't know whether he would bite. But as we both crossed the street, I stopped and he stopped. I walked and he walked, I thought that was very peculiar, so I did it again. I walked he walked. I stopped he stopped. I said, "Oh, this must be a friendly dog," but as I reached over to rub his head he walked way away from me. I couldn't touch him. When I withdrew my hand he came back to my side and continued to walk down the Main Street with me.

I was about five blocks away from home. I walked by some stores. Some were abandoned, and some were not. This one particular store I came to was abandoned with a deep hallway. All of a sudden, two rough looking men jumped out at me in broad daylight, ready to grab me. I jumped back, and then they yelled with fear and ran because they saw the German Shepherd with me. I realized that this German Shepherd had protected me from the two guys. I continued to walk home. When I got two blocks near my house, the dog and I stopped. The German Shepherd stared at me. I tried to coax him into coming home with me because I felt he would be a good watchdog- he had saved my life. Instead, he walked on, and I went on home. All I could say was thank you God.


